Alberta Reliability Standards - Interpretation		
<p>Applicability</p> <p>1 The reliability standards are binding on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) market participants; and (b) the ISO. <p>Requirements</p> <p>Interpretation</p> <p>2 In the reliability standards:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) nothing in any way restricts or limits the powers, duties, and responsibilities of the ISO as set out in legislation; (b) defined terms are in italics, but otherwise, tables of contents, section headers, and the use of underlining, bolding and italicizing are not a part of the interpretation of the reliability standards and are inserted for convenience of reference only; (c) words in the singular include the plural and words in the plural include the singular; (d) words importing male persons include female persons, words importing female persons include male persons, and words importing either sex include corporations; (e) the provisions of the reliability standards are to be construed as always speaking and applied to circumstances as they arise; (f) “may” is to be construed as permissive and empowering, and “must”, “shall” and “will” are to be construed as imperative; (g) all references to a time of day in the reliability standards mean mountain standard or mountain daylight time in the Province of Alberta, whichever is in effect on the day in question; (h) words and phrases in italics (excluding document titles) have the meanings given to them in the definitions found in the Part 1 of the ISO rules and the reliability standards Glossary of Terms; (i) any schedule, table or appendix attached to an reliability standard forms a part of the reliability standard and are to be interpreted accordingly; and 		<p>The AESO is proposing to create an Interpretation Section for the Alberta Reliability Standards. Exclusive Jurisdiction

3 Any **ISO** or **market participant** dispute concerning the application, interpretation or enforceability of any **reliability standard** is within the exclusive jurisdiction of the **Commission** or Courts of the Province of Alberta, as applicable, and any related legal proceedings must be commenced, heard and adjudicated within the applicable Alberta forum.
